#### **Publication Record**

Bang has up until now, authored, co-authored, edited, and co-edited **11 volumes**, including 2 published by Cambridge University Press, and 1 by Oxford. ### **Research Interest**

Bang's work is situated at the crossroads of Roman history, comparative sociology, and world history. Over the last two decades he has been a leading force behind the rise of comparative studies in Roman history. His work has developed from a focus on the economy to include questions of state-formation, imperial universalism, the character of power and the shape of world history. He has been a regular contributor to the recent Stanford project resulting in two volumes comparing the Roman and Han Chinese empires. Parallel to these efforts, Bang organized an international network exploring comparisons between Rome and the Mughal, Ottoman and other tributary empires. Following on from this network, Bang has then taken its agenda further, over the last 4 years, by conducting a Danish Humanities Research Council project with a number of Ph.D.s and Postdocs.

The two strands of work - the China-link as well as the Muslim - are currently coming together in an effort to rethink the imperial experience across history and to re-contextualise the place of Rome in world history.

# Conferences, workshops and invited seminars

During the last two decades Bang has organised, co-organised or spoken at a very considerable number of conferences, panels and seminars across Europe, America and Asia. Among these presentations have been many individually invited papers to research seminars at "Ivy League" institutions such as Princeton, Stanford, Columbia, Yale, Brown and Chicago, as well as Oxford, Cambridge, Heidelberg, Leiden, Tsinghua, Fudan and Zhejiang.
